The Neighbourhood of Dorset Park

The neighbourhood of Dorset Park is located in the Kennedy Road and Ellesmere Road area of Scarborough. It boasts a rich collection of cultures, with almost 59.7 per cent of the community are immigrants. But the Dorset Park neighbourhood also faces barriers to reaching its full potential. It is highly built-up, with few green spaces or recreational areas, particularly in the north end of the

neighbourhood. There is also a high concentration of poverty— 13 per cent of families live on low incomes and 30.7 per cent of households spend 30 per cent or more of their income on shelter costs. Most low-income families are also clustered in the north and south ends of Dorset Park, isolated from important community supports. Local youth also lack access to safe public spaces and programs and services.

Services: Employment supports, including everything from workshops to one-on-one employment counselling and entrepreneurship supports; home care and community services to support independent living; support for families living with mental health challenges; basic needs support, including a community food centre, support for men who have been in conflict with the law, including substance abuse counselling; youth programming and services, including help for youth transitioning from gang involvement; settlement services for newcomers, including support for women in forced marriages and refugee support programs; housing support services, and programs to enhance youth educational attainment.
